Helping Paws



It takes a bit of planning when your pet is coming on a trip with you. Safety is important. While it looks cute for a dog to be hanging out the open window, a sudden stop can send a dog or cat flying out the open window. For this reason, you are now legally required to crate or use a special leash harness for pets to restrain them safely.

Don't forget that you will need more comfort stops on your trip, especially for a nervous or excited pet. But make sure they are on a leash before you let them out of the car, as a strange place or unusual sound (like a backfiring car, for example) could see them heading into the wilderness in fright. Remember to check any walkways, campsites or Airbnb overnight spots to ensure they are pet-friendly.

Also, never leave your pet to wander freely as some people don't appreciate a pet suddenly jumping on them. Here is a list of things you should think about when bringing your pet with you on a road trip:

- Having your pet microchipped means that pets can be easily identified if lost and returned to their home.
- Pets should have vaccinations up-to-date.
- Use a pet harness or crate when travelling by car for safety.
- Hold off feeding your dog for two hours before they travel to avoid car sickness.
- Water and poop stops are required every two hours.
- Never leave your pet in a hot car as they can perish within minutes.
- If staying at someone's home, **clean up where your pet poops** and ensure they behave.
- Take some of their favourite toys for company.
- Always have plenty of water handy for your dog or cat.
- Your dog should be trained to come and obey your commands.
- Ensure you have their medications with you.
- Check out the vets available along your travels, just in case.



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Rusty is a 14-week-old adorable puppy who came into the clinic with a rare disease called polyradiculoneuritis

Polyradiculoneuritis that can affect the motor nerves in older dogs and cats. In Rusty's case, he was unable to sit or stand, and he was very floppy. Luckily, this condition often corrects itself within 2-4 weeks.

Rusty has responded well to nursing and medical care and is recovering well. One of the bacteria that causes this condition can be found in chicken meat, but it cannot live in darker meat such as turkey, duck, or red meat. We suggest removing chicken meat from your pet's diet.

This disease is known as Coon Hound Paralysis in the USA and there it is caused by racoon bites! Check Rusty's recovery by clicking **here** to see the video.
